#### **BOARD ACTIONS**

Following is a summary of actions taken by the Oregon Board of Medical Examiners between August 1, 2000 and December 1, 2000. For an explanation of terms used in this list, please click on glossary of terms.

### CLONINGER, Lee A., PA Applicant, Portland, OR

A final order concluding a contested case was entered October 19, 2000. The order denied Mr. Cloninger's application for a physician assistant's license.

# COOKSLEY, Richard E., PA00272, Myrtle Creek, OR

A stipulated order was entered on November 1, 2000. Licensee was placed on probation for five years and required to participate in the Appropriate Prescribing Workshop.

#### DIENEL, Nicholas H., MD10640, Medford, OR

A stipulated order was entered on October 19, 2000. Licensee was placed on probation for ten years, reprimanded, and required to obtain continuing medical education related to the physician/patient relationship.

#### DOUGHTON, Robert P., MD06350, Portland, OR

A final order concluding a contested case was entered on November 9, 2000. The order required licensee to pay a \$5,000 fine and revoked licensee's right to practice medicine.

#### GARRAN, Thomas A., AC00483, Grants Pass, OR

A corrective action order was entered on September 7, 2000. The order granted an acupuncture icense with the condition licensee would submit to random monthly urine screens.

#### HAMLIN, Virgil L., MD06992, Portland, OR

A stipulated order was entered on October 23, 2000. The order required licensee to enroll in the Oregon Medical Association's PEER program.

#### INTILE, Joseph A., MD07107, Oregon City, OR

An emergency suspension order was entered on September 6, 2000; On October 20, 2000, the Board withdrew the emergency suspension and accepted the Licensee's signed stipulated order of surrender of his license to practice medicine.

#### MCGRIFF, Michael A., MD16246, Salem, OR

A stipulated order was entered on August 28, 2000. Licensee was reprimanded, placed on probation for ten years, and required to be monitored by a mental health professional.

#### MONPERE, Philip M., MD17252, Portland, OR

A final order was entered on November 8, 2000. This order revoked licensee's right to practice medicine.

#### O'DELL, Lawrence W., MD05998, Springfield, OR

A final order was entered on October 23, 2000. The order revoked licensee's right to practice medicine.

#### PATEL, Jayant M., MD15991, Portland, QR

An amended stipulated order was entered on September 12, 2000. The order restricted licensee from performing surgeries involving the pancreas, liver resections, and ileoanal pouch constructions.

#### ROTTER, Steven M., MD15275, Portland, OR

A stipulated order was entered on August 2, 2000. Licensee was placed on probation for five years and reprimanded with practice restrictions.

#### SCHAUB, John S., MD06740, Milwaukie, OR

A final order concluding a contested case was entered on November 9, 2000. The Board found there was a violation of the Medical Practice Act, but suspended any discipline.

#### SMITH, Eric S., MD, Applicant, Vancouver, WA

A final order was entered on November 9, 2000. The final order denied Dr. Smith's application for licensure.

#### SPRANGLE, Kellie M., MD20607, Redmond, OR

A stipulated order was entered on October 27, 2000. Licensee was placed on probation for five years, was reprimand, required to see a mental health professional, and required to participate in the Board's triplicate prescription program.

#### WHITE, Michael C., MD11684, Tualatin, OR

A board order was entered into on November 13, 2000. Licensee will obtain an evaluation at a facility approved by the Board's Medical Director. Licensee voluntarily withdrew from the practice of medicine until the Board receives an evaluation.

#### WILTSE, William E., MD05389, Drain, OR

A stipulated order was entered on October 9, 2000. The order requires Licensee to participate in the Oregon Medical Association's PEER program.

#### ZELLER, Robert, MD04425, Portland, OR

A stipulated order was entered on August 11, 2000. Licensee agreed to retire in lieu of further investigation.

# CAESAR, Richard I., MD12921, Portland, OR

A stipulated order was entered on April 20, 2000. The licensee agreed to withdraw from the practice of medicine for at least one year and enter into a substance abuse treatment program satisfactory to the Board.

# CLAPPISON, Valerie J., MD11307, Portland, OR

A stipulated order was entered on July 21, 2000. Licensee agreed to have her license placed on inactive status while under investigation.

#### ELLISON, Melanie A., MD19066, Albany, OR

A corrective action order was entered on June 28, 2000. The licensee agreed to follow FDA guidelines and pertinent Oregon Administrative Rules when prescribing controlled substances for purposes of weight reduction.

# GOMBART, Augustin K., MD08874, Roseburg, OR

A stipulated order was entered on April 4, 2000. The licensee agreed to withdraw from practice pending completion of the Board's investigation of his competence to practice medicine. The investigation was completed, and the licensee was returned to practice on May 22, 2000, with the condition that licensee obtain consults when he treats cardiac patients.

# GOVE, Jon D., MD09349, Grants Pass, OR

A voluntary limitation was entered on June 28, 2000. The licensee agreed to limit his practice by stipulating that he would not read cerebral MRIs or CTs of the temporal bone.

# HEWITT, Joseph I., MD06041, Oregon City, OR

A final order concluding a contested case was entered April 21, 2000. The terms of the order were as follows: licensee's right to practice medicine is suspended for two years, a reprimand is imposed, and the licensee is required to pay the costs of the hearing.

# LYTLE, Gregory R., DO15017, Heppner, OR

A stipulated order was entered on July 21, 2000. The major terms of the order were as follows: licensee was suspended for 90 days; having served 45 days, the remainder was stayed in lieu of 500 hours of community service; licensee was placed on probation for ten years; licensee was fined \$1,000; licensee was reprimanded; licensee will utilize a chaperone when examining female patients; and licensee will engage in therapy with a doctorate level therapist.

# MORGAN, Charles, MD14095, Portland, OR

The licensee has been practicing under the terms of a voluntary limitation and had requested that the Board release him from the terms of the limitation. On April 20, 2000, a stipulated order was entered

On April 21, 2000, the Board reaffirmed a final order concluding a contested case, which had been entered January 27, 2000. This order imposed a term of probation for five years.

NISHIOKA, Gary J., MD20787, Salem, OR

A stipulated order was entered on July 20, 2000. Licensee was reprimanded.

PEDEN, Joseph C., MD10194, Enterprise, OR

A stipulated order was entered on July 20, 2000. Licensee agreed to surrender his license to practice medicine while under investigation.

SALMON, Peter A., MD18639, Eugene, OR

A final order concluding a contested case was entered April 17, 2000. The final order revoked licensee's right to practice medicine.

WENDLANDT, H. Kay, DO21503, Portland, OR

On May 26, 2000, the Board entered an order of emergency suspension based on concerns about licensee's competence to practice medicine. This order suspended the licensee's right to practice medicine until further notice.

#### **GLOSSARY OF TERMS**

Contested Case Hearing: A hearing, held before an administrative law judge, that results when a licensee disputes the Board's stated legal grounds for disciplinary action under the Medical Practice Act. The hearing ultimately results in a final order which resolves the dispute.

Corrective Action Order: An agreement between the Board and a licensee that concludes an investigation into the licensee's conduct. There is no admission or finding of a violation of the Medical Practice Act; therefore these orders are not disciplinary. The orders do impose action the Board and licensee agree are appropriate to remedy the problem that caused the Board to open an investigation.

**Disciplinary Action:** An action taken under ORS Chapter 677.205. The Board takes disciplinary action in response to a violation of the Medical Practice Act.

**Final Order:** An order imposed by the Board after a contested case hearing has been held. These orders conclude a Board disciplinary action and typically contain a legal finding of fact, an analysis of applicable law, and an order of action. Final orders resulting in a finding of a law violation are disciplinary.


**Medical Practice Act:** ORS Chapter 677. This chapter of Oregon law, which is administered by the Board, gives the Board authority to regulate the practice of medicine in Oregon, including authority to investigate and discipline licensee conduct.

**Stipulated Order:** An agreement between the Board and a licensee which concludes a disciplinary investigation. The licensee admits to a violation of the Medical Practice Act, and the order imposes actions the Board and licensee agree are appropriate. Stipulated orders are disciplinary actions.

**Voluntary Limitation**: An agreement between the Board and a licensee which imposes a limitation on the licensee's right to practice medicine. These orders are utilized in a variety of circumstances such as concluding an investigation of licensee conduct, finalizing a request for licensure or resolving an administrative request. These orders may or may not be disciplinary, depending on how they are constructed and the circumstances in which they are used.

# OREGON BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS

#### INFORMATION REGARDING LICENSE STANDING

#### **Licensure Standing Definitions**

The most serious event is shown under the Standing. For example, if a licensee had prior disciplinary actions and is currently revoked, the standing will be shown as "Revoked." Similarly, "Public Order on File" does not deny a Prior Action, previous Suspension, etc.

Summaries of recent actions are available on the <u>Board Actions</u> page. A full copy of a legal order related to Revoked, Suspended, Surrendered, Public Order on File, Pending, or Prior Action standing may be obtained by making a written request to the OBME and including a \$10.00 fee for each licensee.

**Revoked:** The Board of Medical Examiners has taken disciplinary action by revoking a licensee's right to practice. In order to resume practice, the licensee must reapply for, and be granted, a license by the Board.

Suspended: A licensee has temporarily lost the right to practice. This may be for a specific period or indefinitely.

Surrendered: When used in the context of a licensee's standing, surrendered means a licensee has given up the right to practice in lieu of disciplinary action.

**Restricted** (obsolete): This term is no longer used.

**Pending Action:** The licensee has been formally notified that the Board has found evidence to support a violation of the Medical Practices Act and proposes to take disciplinary action. This is not itself a disciplinary action.

Public Order on File: The Board of Medical Examiners has taken action that has resulted in a Public Order, which relates to the licensee's right to practice.

**Prior Action:** Same as unrestricted except that the licensee has had prior action taken against their license, but that action is no longer in effect.

*Unrestricted:* The licensee has no restrictions on the ability to practice.

attendance of surgical meetings and continuing education courses on improving communication 1 skills and preventing malpractice losses. 2 The Board conducted its own investigation of Licensee's surgical cases, and on 2.3 3 September 22, 1998, Licensee acknowledged before the Board's Investigative Committee that 4 his practice has been restricted at Kaiser and that he made surgical errors. Licensee was 5 questioned on his care of patients whose cases underwent peer review and in particular, patients 6 7 A, B, C, and D. 3. 8 Licensee and the Board desire to settle this matter by the entry of this Stipulated Order. 9 Licensee understands that he has the right to a contested case hearing under the Administrative ٠0 Procedures Act (chapter 183), Oregon Revised Statutes and fully and finally waives the right to 11 a contested case hearing and any appeal therefrom by the signing of and entry of this Order in 12 the Board's records. Jayant Mukundray Patel, MD (Licensee) is a licensed physician in the State of Oregon. 12 2. 13 The Board proposes to take disciplinary action pursuant to ORS 677.205 against Licensee 14 for violations of the Medical Practices Act, to wit ORS 677.190(1)(a) unprofessional or 15 dishonorable conduct as defined in ORS 188(4)(a) and ORS 677.190(14) gross or repeated acts 16 of negligence in the practice of medicine. 17 3. 18 The Board has been informed that Kaiser Foundation limited Licensee's surgical 19 privileges so that he cannot operate on any patients with respect to their pancreas, resection of 20 the liver, or construction of ileoanal pouches. The Board's subsequent investigation revealed 21 acts and conduct alleged to violate the Medical Practices Act, as follows: 22 Patient A, a 59-year-old male, presented with abdominal pain and symptoms of an 3.1 23 incarcerated umbilical hernia in August 1997. Licensee took Patient A to surgery on or about 24. August 12, 1997, and performed an abdominal exploration through a midline incision. Licensee 25 proceeded to perform a segmental resection of the colon. Patient A experienced postoperative 26 complications, to include dehiscence of the wound and distension of the abdomen. He never

1	regained gastrointestinal function. Subsequent medical tests revealed that Licensee had
2	performed the colostomy backwards; Licensee created the colostomy with the distal segment of
3	the sigmoid colon. Patient A underwent another operation on August 26, 1997 to correct the
4	colostomy.
5	3.2 Patient B, an 83-year-old female, presented to Licensee with a 10-cm mass in the
6	pancreatic tail, weight loss and early satiety. She had a history of coronary artery disease,
7	hypertension, congestive heart failure and an infrarenal abdominal aortic aneurysm. Licensee
8	performed a distal pancreatectomy on Patient B on or about November 18, 1996. The mass was
9	found to invade the transverse mesentery and therefore, a right hemicolectomy was performed
10	concurrently. Patient B was hypotensive postoperatively and did not respond to transfusions.
11	She was returned to surgery 14 hours later. She was found to have one liter of blood in her
12	abdomen, with acute ischemia and necrosis of the left colon. Licensee resected the left colon.
13	She deteriorated postoperatively and expired on November 25, 1996.
14	3.3 Patient C, a 65-year-old man, presented with obstructive jaundice and a past
15	history of gallstones, pancreatitis and chronic pancreatic insufficiency. A CT scan showed a 7cm
16	multicystic mass in the head of the pancreas. An ERCP showed an ampullary mass consistent
17	with carcinoma. On November 9, 1994, Licensee performed a Whipple's
18	pancreaticoduodenectomy on Patient B. The pathology confirmed metastases in one of the
19	periportal nodes. Patient C was brought to the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) where he was noted to
20	be hypotensive. He did not respond to treatment and was returned to surgery on November 10 <sup>th</sup> ,
21	where approximately seven liters of blood clot was found in the abdomen. Patient B had diffuse
22	oozing of blood, which required suture ligation and argon coagulator for control. He was
23	returned to the ICU where he experienced additional complications and expired later that day.
24	3.4 Patient D, a 67-year-old male, was admitted on or about September 8, 1997 for
25	hepatic resection. Diagnosed in February 1995 with a hepatocellular carcinoma, Patient D had

previously been treated with chemoembolization, which decreased the size of the mass. A CT

1	scan showed the mass to be in the medial segment of the left lobe. Exploration revealed that the
2	left hepatic artery was thrombosed. On September 8th, Licensee conducted a left hepatic
3	lobectomy, but during this procedure, it was noted that the right lobe of the liver had been
4	devascularized. Licensee decided to perform a right hepatic trisegmentectomy. Patient D was
5	brought to the ICU after surgery, where he developed coagulopathy and significant bleeding.
6	Patient D did not respond to treatment. He was returned to surgery, where 1900 cc's of blood
7	were found in his abdomen. Perihepactic packing was performed. Patient D was returned to the
8	ICU, where he continued to experience internal bleeding and other complications. He expired
9	early the next morning.
10	4.
11	Licensee is entitled to a hearing as provided by the Administrative Procedures Act
12	(chapter 183), Oregon Revised Statutes. Licensee may be represented by counsel at the hearing
13	If Licensee desires a hearing, the Board must receive Licensee's written request for hearing

JAYANT M. PATEL, M.D., the Respondent, was authorized to practice medicine in New York state on May 23, 1980, by the issuance of license number 142170 by the New York State Education Department.

#### **FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS**

- A. On or about September 7, 2000, the Board of Medical Examiners, State of Oregon (hereinafter "Oregon Board"), by a Stipulated Order (hereinafter "Oregon Order"), limited Respondent's license to exclude surgeries involving the pancreas, any resection of the liver, and any constructions of ileoanal pouches, and required Respondent to obtain a second opinion on complicated surgical cases, based on gross negligence and negligence on more than one occasion.
- B. The conduct resulting in the Oregon Board disciplinary action against Respondent would constitute misconduct under the laws of New York state, pursuant to the following sections of New York state Law:
- New York Education Law §6530(3) (negligence on more than one occasion);
   and/or
  - 2. New York Education Law §6530(4) (gross negligence).

# **Help with Online Verifications**

#### Overview

This online search, a service of the State Education Department, permits the public to obtain vital information on the records of more than 1,000,000 licensees in the 44 professions regulated by the Department, including the more than 650,000 who are currently registered to practice within the State. The most important function of professional regulation is to protect the public; this information will help inform people about the licensed professionals who offer services in New York.

Information includes the licensee's name, profession, license number, location, date of original license, and registration status. You may also search <u>summaries</u> of Regents actions on professional discipline, beginning with cases from January 1994, to see if the licensee has been the subject of disciplinary proceedings.

(NOTE: The disciplinary information for physicians, physician assistants and special assistants is available on the Department of Health's Office of Professional Medical Conduct's homepage (<a href="http://www.health.state.ny.us/nysdoh/opmc/main.htm">http://www.health.state.ny.us/nysdoh/opmc/main.htm</a>). Although the State Education Department licenses these professions, the Health Department has the responsibility for discipline.)

# Searching by Name

- Select a profession from the list. You may only choose one profession at a time. Use
  the arrows to the right of the box to scroll through the list of professions, then click
  on the desired profession to highlight/select it.
- Enter at least one letter of a last name; you do not need to enter the complete name, although your search will be more precise the more complete the name. You may only search for one name at a time. Enter last name and a space, **not** a comma, then first name. The name may be entered in either upper or lower case.
- Click on the "Search" button to begin your search.
- The screen will display a list starting with a name which best matches the sequence
  of letters you entered. Scroll through the list to locate the licensee whose record you
  seek, then click on the license number to view that record.

- When searching by license number, you must enter a full six-digit license number. [Note: some RN licenses issued in the 1950s begin with the letters 'B' or 'I' followed by five digits; all other license numbers have six digits.] If a license number has fewer than six digits, insert enough zeros in front of the number to total six digits. If the number includes a dash followed by a single digit (e.g., 000456-1), disregard the dash and the number which follows it. A licensee should be able to provide you with his or her license number upon request.
- Click on the "Search" button to begin your search.
- The screen will display the record of the individual who has been issued the license number you have entered for the profession you selected.

# **Frequent Problems**

- Be sure you select the correct profession. Please note the clarifications below:
  - o *Medicine and Osteopathy* Physicians, including MDs, DOs, and those who may have an equivalent degree from another country.
  - o *Three-year limited license* Licensees who do not meet the citizenship requirement and whose practice is limited to 3 years, sometimes in a specific underserved area.
  - Nurse Practitioner A registered nurse with advanced education in a specialty. All nurse practioners must also be licensed and registered to practice as registered professional nurses.
  - Public Accountant Authorized to practice public accountancy as are Certified Public Accountants (CPAs). Licensees in this profession qualified solely on the basis of experience for a limited period in the late 1950s and early 1960s.
- Be sure to enter and spell the name correctly: last name followed by a space and
  first name (do not use a comma to separate names). If you are uncertain of the full
  spelling, try entering only the first few letters of the last name to display all names
  within the selected profession that begin with the letters entered. Then scroll
  through the list to find the individual you seek.
- Names beginning with Mc, O' and similarly-structured names may appear on the list with or without the apostrophe or the space. Therefore, if you are looking for someone named O'Neil, you should also check ONeil and ONeil.
- **Printing:** Although Netscape 4.x should render pages correctly onscreen, the combination of that browser, the stylesheet used for this site, and certain older model Hewlett-Packard printers will effectively prevent the content of pages from printing. The simplest solution is to change settings in Netscape: on the menu bar, choose Edit/Preferences; select Advanced in the left column, then *uncheck* the box labeled "Enable style sheets" in the righthand section of the page.

# **Glossary of Terms**

- Name: Last name is always displayed first.
- Address: City and state of the professional's address are provided as an aid in identifying the individual. A licensee need not have a New York address to be authorized to practice in the State.
- **Profession:** The name of the profession.
- **License/Registration No:** The unique number of this licensee or entity *within* a particular profession. The same sequence of numbers may be held by others, but *only* in other professions.

- Date of Licensure: The date the individual was licensed in New York. This date may be missing for licenses issued prior to the mid-1980s (see note below).
- Additional Qualification: Some professions provide for an additional qualification, or privilege, which is voluntary and may be obtained either at the time of licensure or subsequently. For example, midwives and nurse practitioners may qualify to write prescriptions after presenting evidence of specified education in pharmacology; social workers may earn insurance reimbursement privileges after either three or six years of qualifying experience. These additional qualifications do not include practice specialties, such as surgery or ophthalmology for physicians. In professions where there are no additional qualifications, the phrase Not applicable in this profession appears. In professions where there is an additional qualification but the individual has not met the requirements, this line is left blank, but this should not be viewed as limiting the licensee's regular practice.

#### Status:

- o Individuals: To practice within New York State, a professional must be licensed and REGISTERED. When a professional informs the Department, either at the time of reregistration or at any time during their current registration period, that he or she will not be practicing in New York, the record is marked INACTIVE. If a registration has lapsed without explanation, the record is marked NOT REGISTERED. If the Department has received reliable notice of the death of a licensee, that record is marked DECEASED. If the license is currently suspended, revoked, or has been surrendered pursuant to disciplinary action, the record is marked LICENSE SUSPENDED, LICENSE REVOKED, or LICENSE SURRENDERED.
- o **Pharmacy Establishments:** Active establishments are currently doing business in New York State. Inactive establishments include those where there has been a transfer of ownership or those that have discontinued doing business in the State.

#### • Registered through:

- o **Individuals:** Registration periods expire on the last day of the month indicated. Physicians are registered for two-year periods, all other professions for three-year periods. Each licensee's registration period is based on his or her month of birth.
- o **Pharmacy Establishments:** All pharmacies, manufacturers and wholesalers are registered for three-year periods.

#### • Pharmacy Establishment Types:

- o **Pharmacy** means any registered place where drugs are dispensed and pharmaceutical care is provided.
- Manufacturer means a person or company engaged in the manufacture of drugs or pharmaceutical devices.
- Wholesaler or Distributor means a person or company engaged in wholesale distribution of drugs, including but not limited to manufacturers; repackagers; own-label distributors; private-label distributors; jobbers; brokers; warehouses, including manufacturers' and distributors' warehouses, chain drug warehouses, and wholesale drug warehouses; independent wholesale drug traders; and retail pharmacies that conduct wholesale distribution.

**Note on Incomplete Records:** The Department computerized licensing in the mid-1980s. Computer records on licenses issued prior to that time may be incomplete because not all data was included in the initial conversion to the computer.
