BUNDABERG HOSPITAL COMMISSION OF INQUIRY

STATEMENT OF DR KEES NYDAM

- 1. I, DR KEES NYDAM, c/- Bundaberg Base Hospital, Bundaberg in the State of Queensland, acknowledge that this written statement is true to the best of my knowledge and belief.
- 2. I have made a previous statement to the Commission of Inquiry. Since signing that statement, I have had the opportunity to read the statement of P99 and comment as follows:
- 3. I recall the case of P99 well. I recall receiving a letter from P99 on 4 October 2004 either in my capacity as Acting Director of Medical Services or in my clinical teaching role. A copy of the letter is attached and marked 'KN1'.
- 4. In relation to paragraph 24 of the statement P99, I did arrange for P99 to attend a meeting with myself to discuss the matters raised in her letter. I assumed that my secretary would have explained my position. It is also my usual habit to reiterate my position when introducing myself.
- 5. In relation to paragraph 25 of the statement of P99, I believe that this meeting occurred on 8 October 2004 and not 4 October 2004. I say this because I replied to P99 by correspondence dated 8 October 2004 thanking her for attending the meeting that day. It is my usual practice to invite patients who have complaints regarding the provision of clinical care to come and discuss those complaints with me in cases where I am the person allocated to handle the complaint. It is not my recollection that my manner was abrasive or that I just wanted P99 out of my room as soon as possible.

- 6. There were two issues that P99 raised as being significant. Firstly, that she had experienced significant pain when a procedure had been undertaken on an infected wound by Dr James Boyd. From the information available to me, I had assumed that Dr Boyd had injected local anaesthetic into an infected or inflamed tissue and then proceeded to resuture the wound. It is my experience that when local anaesthetic is injected into an infected/inflamed wound it neutralises the effect of the local anaesthetic. This is the reason why P99 would have felt and complained of pain. This is a common trap for junior doctors who are unaware of this situation.
- 7. I apologised to P99 and explained to her what had happened. I was happy to own the problem and apologise on behalf of Dr Boyd.
- 8. The second issue raised by P99 was that she was experiencing an ongoing wound infection. There were a number of factors responsible for the ongoing infection and I was of the view that the best way to deal with this was to refer P99 to the Infection Control Coordinator, Gail Aylmer. I prearranged with Ms Aylmer that I would contact her when P99 arrived. My plan was to hand this issue over to her. Gail arrived with one of the microbiology scientists and I left P99 in their care. I considered this to be the appropriate course.
- 9. In relation to paragraph 27 of the statement of P99, I did write to P99 on 8

 October 2004 apologising for what appeared to be sub-optimal care. A copy
 of the letter dated 8 October 2004 is attached and marked 'KN2'.
- 10. Dr Boyd was not at the hospital at that time and I was therefore unable to counsel him in relation to the injecting of local anaesthetic into an infected wound site. I did however use the opportunity to share this practice tip with other medical staff in my continuing education. I made inquiries and was informed that Dr Boyd was on extended leave of absence for an indefinite

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period and had returned to his home in Brisbane. I was not aware as to whether Dr Boyd was returning to the Hospital. Usually, a PHO will only complete a six month rotation at the Hospital.

On March 15th this year I was a importient in your Day Surgery: I went in for an abdominal operation looking for a suspected hernia. I had a previous east on my (R) side which was re-goined. No hernic gras found, but I was informed that say tissue had Den removed because I had alot of adhesions I had 10-12 staples, I cannot remember exactly & I was released on the same day, I was to return days later to have the staples removed. Ofter having the staples removed on the 21.3.04, mytook me home to Burnett Heads, where we lived at that time. We were home only 15 min I felt uneasy in the stomach, went to the B/Room # found blood running down my legs, the top of the wound had opened up. He rang BBH & was told to come straight back to the specialist Courte. I was left sitting in the waiting room for 25 min holding a towel on my stomach. When I finally saw a Doctor, he informed me! only needed the wound to be packed. While laying on the bed awaiting the staff to collect what was needed, I felt a sharp pain & then a unusual sensation, I had then relised

the complete wound had re-opened, I felt forghtened & a little sick, by what I saw. I called to the N/stoff & she recalled the Doctor, who said it still only need to be packe After this was completed I was informed 1 needed to come back the next day, at 9 mm as I was having the wound stopled again). My hosbard & 1 thought they meant Day Surgery again as I was told to fast from Canight. Or arrival at home again, we found a message had been left with my son saying not to come back until Ipm. At this stage I could hardly more due to all the packing I awoke the next morning with a migraine, assuming I was have some sort of surgery, I rang BBH asking if I could take something for my head. I was informed YES. took me back to the specialist a tre as requested by Ipm. I still had a ver lood headache. We were then informed that only a few holding stitches was all ! needed. They would stay in for 14 days. After preperations were made I was injected with aneethetic, the doctor then proceeded. As my head was still thomping, I fell sick then I informed the Doctor that I could feel

everything he was doing. I actually told him a few times. Each time he told me not to worry it would be over soon. The nurse who was assisting was very caring # went out for a cool cloth for my hand, but I could still feel everything that was happening, by which I mean the needle a the stitching going tears & very distressed a poin was Eselewable. Eventually he finally finished & 1 ac givena pethadine injection, & sent home. That night I awoke with a burning sensation In my stomach, & found my tommy not eved. took me to my GP the next morning, who directed us back to BBH to be admitted for Intrevenous antibiotics. We spent almost 5/2 hrs in casualty to be sent home with a box of antibiotics. Let before leaving a Doctor reterned saying he supposed he should do a swab. We whited for the results, but was told (not worry The Keflex started making me sick of the burning was increasing, so we wont book the next day to my GP. She referred us back to BBH again. They changed the anti-biotics & sent home once again. I was very distressed &


